## Dear Friends,

If we consult a dictionary for the definition of change we read "making someone or something different or replacing something with something else. Often the replacement is similar to the original but newer or better."



Christians recognise that last idea... a relationship with Jesus makes our hearts and lives new and better – the best version of itself.

Together with Susan Bradley (admin), Emma Pennington (chaplain), and every member or friend of MU in Canterbury diocese will work for **Transformation, Now!**...our dynamic and challenging theme for 2022.

We will formally commission and pray for these board members at the Festival Service in Canterbury Cathedral on Saturday April 2nd at 1 Iam.

When our decisions and actions result from prayer, then I believe we truly are the hands of Jesus reaching out across the world. Mothers' Union will be represented at the United Nations Commission on the Status for Women, which in March this year will focus on achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls in the context of climate change, environmental and disaster risk reduction policies and programmes.

## **MU Overseas**

### Danièle Ligneau-Wilton, Overseas links Officer

I recently received a copy of the first WOMEN ON THE FRONT LINE (WFL) newsletter edited by our friend Jane Namurye former President of Kajo-Keji MU and currently at Lambeth Palace helping Caroline Welby preparing Lambeth 2022 for Women.

Jane writes:

In the last five years WFL, led by Caroline Welby, has ministered to Bishops' wives, the Mothers Union, and women leaders from across the Anglican Communion.

Our work enables these women to share their experiences with others, breaking down their sense of loneliness and providing a supportive environment for spiritual growth and healing. The ministry of Women on the Frontline has impacted positively in the various contexts across the Anglican Communion.

This year the pandemic has not deterred the work of WFL. Although we have not been able to make any in person visits, we are pleased to share that, despite the inevitable difficulties with connectivity in the world of zoom and technology, we have had three online reunions with Melanesia, Burundi and South Sudan and Sudan together.

The newsletter has pictures of Bishops' Wives in their MU uniforms. It includes their testimonies about the impact WFL is making in their lives and in their work of support and reconciliation, whether it is among ethnic tribes, religious groups, or family members.

Let us pray for the work of WFL and for all the women on the front line.

**Our links** are alive and well. Unfortunately Tarime is no longer with us but we keep them in our prayers.

Our friends in Rwanda are well despite some deaths due to Covid. In Kigali, MU has started a ministry for women on the street, teaching them a new way of living in Christ, training them in practical skills to earn a living, and feeding malnourished children.

#### Akoko-Edo, Nigeria

Akoko Edo is in the South of Nigeria, a fairly peaceful part of Nigeria. Victoria Oyekpen (Vicky), the MU President in Akoko-Edo wrote recently:

I thank you very much for your concern and prayers for us. God will increase the harvest of His church and enable thanksgivings repeatedly in Jesus name. We are fine and leaning on Jesus. Our love to you and to the Mothers' Union in Canterbury. Stay blessed now and always.



#### Dutse, Nigeria

We received a number of messages from Dutse in the summer asking for prayers as kidnappings, torture and killing of people continue close to the Diocese, in North West Nigeria. Cultivating land is made more difficult because of the constant danger the people are facing in addition to the lack of rain. Covid is nothing compared to the daily sufferings people are enduring. They are only sustained by their Faith and prayers.

In October, Bishop Markus Danbinta (who writes on behalf of Mothers Union) wrote:

We are at the season of harvest. Crops like maize, rice and soya beans are being harvested. However, in Jigawa state and many other states in Northwestern Nigeria, many farmers will not harvest their rice as a result of drought. Rice is mostly consumed more than any other food crop in this area and I sensed that there will be severe famine this year coupled with the insecurity challenges which already devastated the zone and hindered many from cultivating their lands.

#### Kajo-Keji, South Sudan

It was good to hear that people in the camps in Uganda are slowly going back to their homes in Kajo-Keji, and taking charge of their own land at last. Bishop Emmanuel has left Moyo (where the Diocese had taken refuge) and is now based in Kajo-Keji where a MU conference was held this summer for the first time in several years. The main themes were prayers, intercessions, forgiveness and reconciliation.

In the summer, 75 MU members joined forces, and worked on vegetable growing. They also continue mask making (distributed to the community) and dignity kits for girls.

### Modern slavery and exploitation NATIONAL HELPLINE 08000 121 700

To mark **Anti-Slavery Day** (18<sup>th</sup> October 2021), the Mothers' Union has spent the summer crocheting giant chains that symbolise the number of unseen victims of modern slavery.

The eye-catching chains have enabled us to raise awareness of the presence of modern slavery to a much wider audience. They are a powerful symbol and we hope that our chain of **191 links** will help people begin to grasp the true scale and horror of the issue in our communities. We hope our collective craftivism in making this chain will result in many conversations about modern slavery and people resolving to take concrete action to report and stop abuse and exploitation.

In 2018, Kent Police carried out 171 investigations into slavery offences – our links reflect this crime statistic.

The Mother's Union, in collaboration with The Clewer Initiative (the Church of England's response to modern slavery), was looking for a way to generate interest around Anti-Slavery Day and raise awareness of modern slavery in a COVID-secure way.

The Global Slavery Index estimates there are 136,000 victims of modern slavery in the UK. Traffickers prey on the vulnerable, the homeless, on young people who are alone or lacking strong support networks, in foster care, or maybe when there is disruption at home. Modern Slavery, forced labour, can happen anywhere, not only in cities and towns, at the car wash and nail bar, but also in our rural areas – more than 900 incidents were reported.

#### In this sanctuary we ask that you pray for the survivors of abuse and exploitation.



Lord, you are a God who sets the captives free. Your Spirit searches restlessly for those in despair, that they may find the life you are calling them to. We pray for those who are being trafficked and callously put to work in our region. On the cross, you were powerless and subject to the cruelty of others. Look with mercy on those who suffer this way. May we, who are blinded by the shallow distractions of daily life, feel the fear of the cornered and be roused to action. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

## **Knitted or Crochet Crosses**



Using double knitting yarn and 4mm needles cast on 10 stitches Knit 28 rows (also known as garter stitch) Cast on 6 stitches at the beginning of the next 2 rows Knit 10 rows Cast off 6 stitches at the beginning of the next 2 rows. Knit 14 rows Cast on 6 stitches at the beginning of the next 2 rows Knit 10 rows Cast off 6 stitches at the beginning of the next 2 rows Knit 28 rows on remaining 10 stitches Cast off leaving tail for sewing up. Fold in half and sew up putting a little stuffing between the two crosses being sewn together.

For crochet version use the above instructions but replace knit (garter stitch) with double crochet.

Place each one in an individual bag with a blessing or verse

Due to the current COVID and the need to sanitise we suggest that you bag each one and add the blessing into the bag, but first very lightly spray each one with antibacterial spray (not to soak them but to sanitise them), then put them in the bags before handing out.

- you can laminate the blessing but doesn't matter if it isn't.

The sprays are easy to get and can be cheap but effective.

Just to ensure we are being careful at the moment with things.

Suggested verses to include with them: Isaiah 41 :10 - Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

Psalm 28:7

The LORD is my strength and my shield; my heart trusts in him, and he helps me. My heart leaps for joy, and with my song I praise him. May the Hope of Jesus Christ be with you at Christmas and Always Love from the Church of ....


