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Prayer is like a telephone!



Before being ordained I was, for many years a primary school teacher. One of my responsibilities was to plan and often to deliver assemblies and that usually included choosing a hymn. There were some real favourites but also a few that to be honest I found a bit odd. One of these began with the words "prayer is like a telephone." Somehow I could never quite get on with this image although the pupils liked to sing the song, and I certainly never thought I would end up quite literally using the telephone as a major way of praying with people. Yet in these strange times

that is one of the things I have been doing a great deal. Instead of pastoral visiting I have been doing a lot of pastoral telephoning and I even helped to conduct a funeral by phone recently which felt strange but was also a very positive experience. With so many of our congregation self-isolating the phone has become a real lifeline and a vital way of staying in touch especially for people who don't have computers, smart phones, or tablets.

A simple "hello, how are you doing?" has led to many a thoughtful conversation sometimes with much laughter, sometimes with a bit of philosophy and sometimes with some tears and fears.

This is

something we can all do, just a simple keeping in touch can make a real contribution to support we all need. I was worried that when the churches had to be closed that we would not be able to meet the pastoral needs of the people who I knew would want to seek comfort from their faith. In fact, the reverse has happened, and I think I have spoken more and to more people than at any time before in my ministry.

I am lucky to be quite technology confident, so I have also done my fair share of Zooming, (thank you Rev Andrew Whitehead for getting me started). But it seems to me that the best way that we can often help people is just to listen. The hymn I mentioned at the beginning has a chorus which goes 'We can shout out loud. We can whisper softly. We can make no noise at all. But He'll always hear our call.' In these sad and often difficult times I hope that knowing that He will always hear our call will be of some comfort to you because it is quite simply the truth. We don't even have to say anything for our loving Father to hear what is in our hearts. He doesn't need a telephone to hear us and He's always willing to listen.

I credit him with assembling a routine as he does daily exercises and gymnastic skills with the children. In fits and starts we attempt some of the work uploaded by the school on their website. This can involve playing online maths games and watching phonics based YouTube videos (very popular) alongside some

Alongside this we have attempted maths skills in the kitchen (making pizza, gingerbread and other weight increasing recipes), story and science lessons with Granny and Granddad on Zoom and on YouTube geography lessons, watching Bear Grylls trek through rainforests and eating tarantulas.

In all of this I am grateful for many things. I am grateful for the quality time I get to spend with my family. I am grateful for the community connectedness that seems to have emerged; key workers and their roles, the support of others like MU members using their skills, abilities and prayers. Above all, I am grateful to God who is bigger than any pandemic and keeps his promise that "he will never leave you nor forsake you" (Deuteronomy 31 v 6).
